

CANADIAN CONCERT BAND FESTIVAL REPORT JOHN WHITE, CHAIRMAN



The 1989 Canadian Concert Band Festival will feature an outstanding slate of adjudicators and clinicians who have been engaged to provide constructive commentary for their further growth of ensembles attending MusicFest '89 in Toronto. In addition to continuing the sight

reading class initiated in 1988, the 1989 Canadian Concert Band Festival will provide performance opportunities for small ensembles as detailed in the Rules and Regulations. As many Regional Festivals do not yet have classes for chamber ensembles, it may be difficult for some ensembles to obtain an invitation to the National Finals through a Regional Festival. Chamber ensembles comprising students from concert bands which will participate in MusicFest '89 may seek an invitation to perform by forwarding an audition tape to the Chairman of the Canadian Concert Band Festival. As a further innovation, directors of concert bands participating in MusicFest '89 will also receive a confidential video tape of the performance with accompanying commentary provided by Dr. Allan McMurray.

In order to ensure a quality experience for all groups, the total number of available time slots for concert band performances in Toronto has been limited to 92. Classes will

In the past few years, a number of very positive changes have been made in the CSBF Division of MusicFest Canada. The inclusion of a comprehensive clinic after the performance, the addition of many more workshops on both generic and specific topics, and the opportunity for students to individually

direction, the Executive Committee has made the decision to eliminate on a trial basis from this year's Finals the reference to the "Most Outstanding" ensemble. There are several reasons why the Executive Committee has made this decision. First of all, we believe that from a music education point of view it is desirable to de-emphasize the competitive aspect of music. To perform in an ensemble requires a great deal of sophisticated skills and techniques. These skills should be developed without unnecessary stress; competitions tend to generate an unbelievable stress on the director and the students. In music classes we are trying to develop a variety of life skills and to cultivate a sensitivity towards a true art form. This sensitivity can be a lifetime goal and it is the Executive Committee's belief that the results will be more musical, and more valid, without the added stress and strain of having to prove oneself as "Most Outstanding." Secondly, the Executive Committee felt there is sufficient merit in having ensembles perform to a standard, and especially, to perform for each other for the sake of the music. Some of the most inspiring festivals students have attended have been non-competitive -- festivals where everyone is a winner because the effort is put into performing to the best of one's ability for the benefit of both the participants and the audience.

Let's develop in our students a healthy attitude towards appreciation of the talents and efforts of other performing musicians. Surely we can report on successes in music education, without using a competitive "Most Outstanding," as our measuring stick. Let's recognize ALL participants who reach a bronze, silver or gold standard of performance!
