THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

QUICK REACTION TIME PAYS OFF

From my vantage point as President of MusicFest Canada, I have sometimes marvelled at the speed at which change occurs both within our organization and throughout the world. I am equally amazed at times how quickly this particular group of people collectively known as "MusicFest" act and react.

The opportunity to become involved with MUSIC '91 is an excellent case in point. The Government of British Columbia designated 1991 to be a year of musical celebration throughout the Province, hosting major world events. As part of this celebration of talent, MusicFest Canada agreed to stage the National Festival under their umbrella in Vancouver in May, 1991, and we are receiving the same signals as those which preceded the incredible Expo '86 event. MusicFest is committed to provide every possible opportunity for this year's participants. Beyond the normal evening concerts, cabarets, clinics, workshops and onsite events, MUSIC '91 has offered it's complete performance program and can arrange for public performances and tours throughout British Columbia. This year, ensembles can perform all the way to and from Vancouver and the National Festival.

As we know, travel to and production of a National Event such as MusicFest Canada costs money. With the present situation regarding oil prices, increasing airfares and the GST being levied (please see our Executive Director's letter to Prime Minister Mulroney on page 3), these costs are continuing to escalate for all of us. MusicFest is aware of this and has reacted quickly to provide assistance.

MusicFest has entered into an agreement with Canadian Airlines International. Not only have they agreed, on extremely short notice, to hold the August seat sale prices until December 1, 1990, they have further allocated 4,000 seats specifically for MusicFest participants. MusicFest has booked hotel rooms throughout the Lower Mainland area, including the UBC residences, in order to ensure reasonably priced accommodations are available in spite of the added GST.

General Motors has once again come to the rescue and is providing financial backing for the Provincial Lotteries on an expanded scale. Groups will be able to raise money through the sale of raffle tickets on brand new 1991 General Motors/Chevrolet Trackers.

Yamaha Canada Music Limited has also recognized the strain that we are under, Nationally and Regionally, and in turn has committed their full support to make the Festival the ultimate educational event. Yamaha continues to be a faithful ally of education in this country.

I congratulate everyone who has worked so diligently and so quickly to make the Vancouver Festival as accessible as possible in the face of mounting economic and social pressures throughout Canada. In order for you as a participant to enjoy the benefits of this work it is important that you make plans earlier than ever before. THE GST WILL HAVE PROFOUND EFFECT ON CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS

As Ben Franklin once said, the only sure things in life are death and taxes. The one sure thing about Canada's newest tax, the Goods and Services Tax (GST), is that prices will rise and not fall. Below is a letter sent to Prime Minister Mulroney from our Executive Director, Jim Howard, outlining MusicFest's concerns, especially the fact the our increased costs will inevitably be borne by the young musicians who attend MusicFest events throughout Canada.

Dear Prime Minister:

MusicFest Canada is a registered not for profit organization that consists of some 80 regional festivals throughout Canada involving over 400,000 young musicians. Every young person who plays an instrument or sings in this country is involved in this programme at the regional level, and last year approximately 8,000 qualified and attended the National Festival in Winnipeg.

For years we have requested funding from your Department of Communications and received letters of rejection and often not even the courtesy of a reply. Now, we are faced with a GST that is guaranteed to increase our production costs and, therefore, the cost to each participant attending the event.

In spite of the rhetoric, such as the vague term "replacement", the fact is that non profit organizations such as ours are going to pay tax on items on which we have never before had to pay tax. For example, a large portion of our budget is allocated to printing and convention centre facility costs. There is no added tax on the facility costs. Regarding printing costs, as a non profit corporation we have been tax exempt in the past. To my astonishment, the Excise Tax Office in Calgary informed me that even "exempt" payments are subject to at least 50% of the GST. This tax is oppressive on the volunteer organizations of Canada and is neither hidden nor a replacement. Also, the majority of the 8,000 participants at our National Festival stay in hotel rooms. In addition to the existing provincial hotel taxes, hotel room costs will now be increased by 7%. The most unfortunate part is that the tax ends up being paid by the young people who we are trying so hard to serve.

Your message to Canada is clear. This Conservative Government is not prepared to provide any new or existing offsetting funding for a national educational event like MusicFest. However, your Government is prepared to levy taxes which will unavoidably be passed on to the young people of this country. I can only hope that your Government realizes this gross miscarriage of justice and adjusts the guidelines before they can take effect.

MUSICFEST CANADA 1991 SCHOLARSHIP AUDITIONS

MusicFest Canada is pleased to announce that there will be \$32,500 in individual cash scholarships available at MusicFest '91 in Vancouver.

The following scholarships are available:

All candidates must complete the attached application form, one for each Festival Division you are applying for (Stage Band, Concert Band or Choral) and send an audition tape which must arrive on or before APRIL 17, 1991. Candidates auditioning for the scholarships listed above may also be eligible for \$70,000 in scholarships being offered by post-secondary institutions. A. GENERAL INFORMATION

- The candidate must be in his/her final year of secondary school and be intending to pursue his/her studies with a professional musician/educator or at a suitable postsecondary institution.
- The candidate must be a member of a performing ensemble participating in MusicFest Canada '91 in Vancouver. The application and tape must be received by April 17, 1991, even if the ensemble has not yet qualified.
- The candidate must have his/her application form signed by his/her secondary school music teacher.
- 4. The candidate must prepare two contrasting selections or one selection which includes two styles. The maximum duration of performance is 10 minutes. The candidate is encouraged to include at least one selection of Canadian origin.

- 5. Jazz candidates should improvise as part of their presentation.
- Vocal candidates may prepare their selections in either or both traditional and/or jazz styles. Please do not record with echo, reverb, analogue delay or other "enhancement".
- 7. The candidate has the option of unaccompanied or accompanied auditions. Although it is strongly recommended that candidates use a single accompanying instrument (usually piano) MusicFest Canada recognizes that jazz candidates may wish to use a back up rhythm section and concert band percussionists may wish harmonic and melodic support. (MusicFest will accept a maximum of four accompanying persons.)
- 8. The candidate may apply in more than one area (eg. concert band and jazz, etc.): however, separate applications and tapes are required. No tapes will be returned. MusicFest recommends that a good quality audio tape be submitted and that the quality of the recording be of a good standard.
- 9. The candidate will announce his/her name and selections at the beginning of the cassette tape. Print name and selections clearly on the tape label.
- 10. The candidate must be a Canadian citizen or a landed immigrant.

B. FINAL AUDITIONS

All applications and tapes will be screened by an adjudication panel. The panel will select the most outstanding candidates to perform in live auditions at the National Festival. The decision of the panel will be final.

- 1. Finalists will be notified by May 1, 1991 of the date, time and location of their audition.
- MusicFest will supply an acoustic piano, drum kit, bass amp, guitar amp, bass drum, 4 tympani (23", 26", 29", 32"), orchestra bells, xylophone and chimes for the candidates and/or accompanists. Vocal jazz candidates may use the Festival sound system.
- 3. The candidate will perform two contrasting selections or one selection which includes two styles. The maximum performance time is 10 minutes in front of an audience and a panel of adjudicators. The decision of the Festival will be final.
- 4. The candidate will supply his/her own instrument except as noted in B 2.

C. ANNOUNCEMENT

The scholarship recipients will be announced at the Closing Ceremony.

THE CANADIAN CHORAL FESTIVAL REPORT RUSS BAIRD, CHAIRMAN

MusicFest Canada includes in its "objectives" the provision that we shall endeavour "to compliment and enhance the teaching, learning and growing process". To this end we look at several factors in the assembly of the Canadian Choral Festival:

- 1. Having evaluators who are famailiar with the Canadian Choral scene.
- Insuring that our clinicians are first and foremost "educators".
- Constantly examining and reexamining our efforts in the pursuit of ever more significant opportunities to enrich the MusicFest experience.
- Constantly soliciting input from our Regional Coordinators and participating directors.

The Canadian Choral Festival has received the support of the most outstanding community, high school and university choral programs in the country. In Winnipeg at MusicFest '90 we were privileged to share the choral work of ensembles from Nova Scotia to British Columbia. We were privileged to hear the incomparable Winnipeg Singers under the direction of Festival Evaluator Jon Martens; we were treated to the Vocal Jazz of Nitecap under the tutelage of Festival Clinician Rejean Marois; and the Festival was rounded out by Voice Deco, six Festival grads who came together because of a pure and simple passion for the choral art.

At MusicFest our participants meet, share, grow and build friendships that will last for years to come. It is difficult to measure who is the greater benefactor...the student, the teacher or those who work to make the Festival a success.

What should you expect for MusicFest '91?

In Vancouver we will try to offer "off site" performance opportunities in the downtown area. The focus for our clinic sessions will be... "mass choral opportunities" and "proper vocal technique" (especially in Vocal Jazz). There will be workshops specifically for directors. We will introduce special clinics for Vocal Jazz Rhythm Sections. Included in our tentative lineup of performing ensembles, evaluators and clinicians are... CANADIAN CONCERT BAND FESTIVAL REPORT JOHN WHITE, CHAIRMAN

On the heels of an excellent Festival in Winnipeg, the Concert Band Committee will be striving to produce an even better and more valid Festival in Vancouver. As a result of several 'feedback' sessions with directors, adjudicators and clinicians held during the Winnipeg event, the Canadian Concert Band Festival Committee collected many constructive comments with regard to the Festival's strengths and the areas which can be improved.

To that end we will: Maintain and expand the program of workshops initiated in 1990 and featured the distinguished members of the adjudication/clinician team; continue to use and advocate wider use of the criterion referenced adjudication materials introduced in 1990; provide more clinics for students on concert band instruments; continue to provide a video taped commentary for the professional development of concert band directors; and encourage the use of the National Syllabus at Regional Festivals. We will also endeavour to provide an even more 'formal' setting for the Concert Band performances commensurate with the prestige of the event and the number of ensembles and students participating in this Division of the Festival. We also hope to encourage even greater involvement in the Chamber Ensemble category of the C.C.B.F.

The most significant change for 1991 will undoubtedly be the requirement that all participating ensembles perform in an adjudicated sight-reading class. For the past three years the sight-reading component has been optional although approximately 95% of all groups have elected to take part. In the discussions held in Winnipeg there were strong statements from adjudicators, clinicians, participating directors and Committee members that the sight-reading portion of the Festival be formalized, required and adjudicated. These changes will take effect in 1991 and they are reflected in the current edition of the Rules and Regulations for MusicFest Canada. The sight-reading adjudicator will apply the same criterion referenced Standard of Performance utilized by the adjudicators in the main performance venue but the sight-reading material will be very carefully selected to be two levels below the grade of music presented by each ensemble in their prepared performance. The adjudication will represent one-quarter of the final Standard of Performance assigned - equal in value to each of the three adjudications of the prepared performance.

In June a copy of the revised C.C.B.F. Syllabus for 1991 was mailed to major music retailers throughout Canada so they will be prepared for your music requests and orders. The list of pieces undergoes a yearly review and the most long-term selection in each Class is deleted and replaced by a new title.

To each of you, my best wishes for a most successful and enjoyable year of music. Hook forward to seeing you in Vancouver!
