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

WHAT ALL PARTICIPANTS SHOULD KNOW

In order to make your MusicFest '92 experience as educational and enjoyable as possible, this newspaper will encompass the most important aspects of the Festival.

With the information provided, you will be able to discuss in advance the concerts, cabarets and workshops which will best meet your goals in attending MusicFest Canada in Halifax/Dartmouth.



GENERAL INFORMATION

CONFIRMATIONS OF PERFORMANCE

All Confirmations of Performance and times are mailed out by May 1. This will tell you where and when you will be performing. You must report to the warm up check-in desk 50 minutes prior to your performance to allow your ensemble to warm-up 45 minutes prior to the performance. The check-in desk is located on the lower entry level of the World Trade and Convention Centre and in the Foyer of the Rebecca Cohn Theatre for ensembles performing at the Dalhousie University complex.

REGISTRATION PROCESS FOR PARTICIPANTS

It is imperative to register at the Registration Desk prior to taking in any activities at the Festival. You will need to pick up your Festival Passes before your adjudicated performance or attending any workshops or concerts. If you need to purchase any additional passes you may do so at the Desk. The Registration Desk is located on the lower entry level of the World Trade and Convention Centre at the Cornwallis 1 room. The office will be open on Tuesday, May 12 from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm, Wednesday to Saturday 7:00 am to 7:00 pm, and Sunday from 7:00 am to 3:00 pm. Please allow yourself plenty of time to register prior to your performance time. There will be a \$45.00 replacement fee assessed for any lost participant passes, with no exceptions. Each registered participant will receive a Participant Pass, Official Program, Poster and Festival Newspaper. Passes must be worn at all times while on the Festival Sites.

ADJUDICATION PACKAGES

Standards of Performance plaques, the Gold, Silver and Bronze awards for each participating ensemble, will be available for pick up, along with adjudication sheets, at the Registration Desk the morning following the adjudicated performance of each ensemble. For those groups performing on Sunday, May 19, adjudication packages will be available for pick up between 6:30 pm and 7:30 pm Sunday evening. Honour Award Recipients will receive their Yamaha Tour Jackets and Plaques immediately following the adjudicated performance of their ensemble. These awards will be presented by an adjudicator. All scholarship winners will be announced at the Closing Ceremonies. Please note that any adjudication packages not picked up will be sent to the school after the Festival by courier as soon as possible.

REGISTRATION FORMS AND FEES

Registration forms are an integral part of the MusicFest experience. These forms enable the staff to ensure that the performance stage is ready, the sound technicians get the sound just right, the ensemble is scheduled in the correct class and category for publication in the Official Program, the room supervisors can introduce the group correctly, and the adjudicators will properly identify the ensemble and the selections to be performed. These forms must be received by April 6, 1992. The best way is by Courier. All incomplete forms must be completed at the Registration Desk which will result in possible delays in registration. Ensembles receive a statement of account with the Confirmation of Performance. All registration payments are due by April 18, 1992. Registration fees must be paid in full and all forms completed before passes will be issued to any ensemble.

INSTRUMENT REPAIR SHOP

The Repair Shop, sponsored by Buckley's Music, will be located on Level 3 of the World Trade & Convention Centre, Highland 10 room. Emergency supplies will be available. As Buckley's is only a few blocks from the World Trade and Convention Centre, some minor repairs will be done in the store's shop. All minor repairs will be free of charge to MusicFest Canada participants.

DIRECTORS' RECEPTION

Allen S. Michalek, President and Chairman of the Board of MusicFest Canada, invites all ensemble directors and guests to the annual Directors' Reception, Sunday, May 17, following the Closing Ceremonies. In a very short program, major corporate sponsors and government dignitaries will be introduced. Invitations and information are available at the main festival office (near the registration office).

PARTICIPANTS' PARTY

All participants are invited to join the party and dance sponsored by Buckley's Music Ltd. and featuring the high-tech video dance system and team headed by Jim Lindh. This will take place in the World Trade & Convention Centre following the closing ceremonies.

CKY-TV from Winnipeg will be shooting footage of groups performing at MusicFest Canada throughout the five days. CHAIRMAN, CANADIAN CHORAL FESTIVAL

He is also coordinator of the Ontario Vocal Jazz Festival. John tours extensively with his ensembles and in May of 1991 received the "Outstanding Vocal Jazz Director" award at MusicFest Canada in Vancouver.

He is also a Past President of the Canadian Band Association, where he served for five years, and remains the Publications Officer for the Canadian Band Journal.

MUSICFEST CANADA CONCERT GOER'S GUIDE

In an effort to ensure that all participants in the 1992 Halifax/Dartmouth Festival enjoy and benefit from the experience, MusicFest Canada requests that all participating students and directors discuss the expectations pertaining to concert behaviour noted below. These expectations have been created to ensure that all audience members will be able to enjoy the performances in a quiet, concert hall atmosphere free from distractions of extraneous noise and movement. It is important that audience members show the same respect for performers on stage as they themselves would expect of an audience attending their performance.

HOW TO GET THE MOST OUT OF THE FESTIVAL PERFORMANCES AND EVENING CONCERTS!!

- 1. Try to sit together as a group with directors and chaperones in attendance.
- Do not talk during the performances. Even quiet conversation will distract those people seated around you and may also prevent the performers from giving you their best effort. Remember to show the same respect you would expect if you were on stage.
- 3. Try to stay seated for the entire concert. The planning committee for MusicFest Canada '92 has endeavored to keep concerts to a maximum of one hour and fifteen minutes so that you will be able to be seated for the entire performance. If you have to leave the concert hall for an emergency please try to do so between selections and definitely wait until an opportunity between selections to return to your seat. Reason ... any movement in and out of the concert hall will distract both your fellow audience members and the performers.
- 4. Remember to show appreciation in ways appropriate to the performance.

Let's make MusicFest '92 in Halifax/Dartmouth the most enjoyable and mutually supportive festival ever!

OUTSTANDING ADJUDICATORS/CLINICIANS



GENE AITKEN — Evaluator/Clinician

Gene Aitken is presently serving as Director of the Jazz Studies Program at the University of Northern Colorado. He is also Associate Director of the School of Music, Director of the UNC Music Technology and Resource Centre and Director of the UNC Press. In 1986, the UNC Axidental and the UNC Vocal Jazz 1, under Gene's direction, received a Grammy nomination for their album, "Hot IV". The "Gene Aitken Vocal Jazz Series" is published by Kendor Music Inc. In addition, Gene also operates a video post-production studio in Los Angeles.



RANDY BRECKER - Clinician/Concert Artist

Randy Brecker has been shaping the sound of jazz, R&B and rock for more than two decades. His trumpet and flugelhorn performances have added sparkle and verve to a wide range of works, with artists ranging from James Taylor to Blood Sweat and Tears, to straight ahead jazzmen including Horace Silver and Art Blakey. He studied classical trumpet with members of the Philadelphia Orchestra and performed with the award winning Indiana University Jazz Ensemble, which toured the Near East for the U.S. State Department. Randy will be performing in concert with the Falconaires on Saturday, May 16, and will be directing and performing with the Yamaha All-Star Jazz Ensemble, Sunday, May 17. APRIL ARABIAN - Evaluator/Clinician

April Arabian is presently serving as Assistant Professor of Voice at the prestigious Berklee College of Music in Boston. She is a professional singer, performer and conductor and can be heard on national radio and television commercials, numerous live jazz sessions and industrial shows as well as with the Symphony Choruses of both Boston and Chicago. Professor Arabian will be appearing with her outstanding vocal jazz ensemble as part of the Evening Cabaret program at Music Fest Canada. April Arabian is sponsored by the Berklee College of Music.



JEREMY S. BROWN — Adjudicator/Clinician

Jeremy Brown is presently serving as assistant professor in music education at the University of Calgary where he conducts the symphonic band, teaches saxophone, directs one of the two jazz ensembles and teaches music education courses. He recently was awarded a research fellowship from Ohio State University and was recognized as the "Outstanding Graduate Teaching Assistant" for his work with the wind ensemble and concert band. Mr. Brown has performed professionally with Paul Anka and Mel Torme, toured with "Annie" and "A Chorus Line", and recorded two albums with the Eastman School of Music and the Ohio State University Concert Bands. In addition, he can be heard on CBC Radio.



TOMMY BANKS — Adjudicator/Clinician

Tommy Banks is a composer, arranger, recording artist and professional performer with an international reputation. He has been called upon by the Canadian government on numerous occasions as a musical director, and, recently, was appointed to the Canada Council. He conducted the first foreign jazz band to tour China in 1983, and has also toured Japan, Hong Kong and Malaysia. Tommy's distinguished career has included performances with Roberta Flack, Johnny Mathis, Aretha Franklin, Cleo Laine, Henry Mancini and Dizzy Gillespie. In addition, he was the music director for the Pope's 1986 visit to Canada and for the 1988 Winter Olympic Games in Calgary.



DR. WARRICK CARTER - Adjudicator/Clinician

Dr. Warrick Carter is presently serving as Dean of Faculty at the Berklee College of Music in Boston, Massachusetts. He has performed professionally at the Montreaux International Jazz Festival and appeared in Korea, Japan, Taiwan, Canada, Mexico and Brazil as a performer, lecturer, adjudicator and clinician. Dr. Carter is also the former chairman of the jazz panel and co-chair of the music policy panel of the National Endowment for the Arts. He is a respected author and a leading authority on jazz education in the college curriculum, and has written books on indigenous American music, jazz pedagogy and black composers of the European tradition. Dr. Carter is sponsored by the Berklee College of Music.



DR. GEOFFREY BOERS - Evaluator/Clinician

Dr. Geoffrey Boers received his Doctorate in Choral Conducting with specialities in Renaissance Musicology and Choral Pedagogy. He has served as Music Director of the midwest's premier Baroque opera company, Ex Machina, as well as Director of Music at Calvary Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. Dr. Boers is presently serving as Director of Choral Activities at Central Washington University where he teaches choral conducting, choral history, choral methods, voice and still finds time to sing professionally as a countertenor soloist with ensembles from throughout the United States.



DENNY CHRISTIANSON — Adjudicator/Clinician

Denny Christianson has made his mark as a performer, arranger, composer, studio musician, band leader and educator. He has toured extensively through Canada and Europe with his 18-man band and appeared on CBC, CTV and SRC television specials. His band has been featured at the Montreal International Jazz Festival and he has been honored with three nominations for Best Jazz Album of the Year, Denny has worked and recorded with Ray Charles, Stevie Wonder, Smokey Robinson, Jon Faddis, J.J. Johnson, Kai Winding, Bill Holman and Ed Shaughnessy. In addition, he is a faculty member of the National Music Camp and served as an awards juror for the Canada Council. Denny is currently in production of his fifth album, this time with his new jazz fusion group, "Sortie", and most recently completed writing a full-length musical entitled "Nostradamus", based on the life of the famous French prophet.



GILBERT BOURGOIN — Adjudicator/Clinician

Gilbert Bourgoin is presently enjoying his 19th year in music education with the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal. He has studied and received degrees from "College Sainte-Anne" in Nova Scotia and from "Ecole de Musique Viuncent d'Indy" in Montreal along with his Master of Arts in Education. He is the coordinator and conductor of the R.H.S. Symphonic Winds and Chorale in Montreal and continues to serve as a workshop leader and clinician at all levels of education throughout Canada and the United States.



DR. GALEN DARROUGH - Evaluator/Clinician

Dr. Galen Darrough is presently serving at Director of Choral Activities and Choral Music Education at the University of Northern Colorado. He is the conductor of the 60 voice Concert Choir, 70 voice Men's Glee Club, 90 voice Women's Glee Club and of the Longmont Chorale. Dr. Darrough has performed and/or studied with Howard Swan, Paul Salammovich, Helmuth Rilling, William Hall, Charles Hirt, Douglas McEwen and Roger Wagner. In addition, he has directed, adjudicated and served as clinician to choirs in Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico and Utah.



DUANE S. DAVIS - Adjudicator/Clinician

Duane Davis is presently serving as Director of Vocal Music at Grand Rapids Community College where he directs four vocal ensembles. He is also an instructor at Western Michigan University where he is the director of CG II. He has performed in Carnegie Hall, giving a New York premier of Missa O Pulchritudo, and last year was invited to perform by the American Choral Directors Association at the University of Michigan "Choral Hour." In addition, Duane has served as Musical Director for thirty musicals including Community Circle Theatre, the Robeson Players and J.R. Randolph Theatre Company. He serves on the Board of Trustees for Blue Lake and has taken the Blue Lake International Choir on six European tours.



JAMES HARGREAVES — Adjudicator/Clinician

James Hargreaves is presently serving as Associate Professor of Music at St. Francis Xavier University where he has held the post since 1971. Before emigrating to Canada, he was the principal cornet of Her Majesty's Scots Guards Band and later Professor of Trumpet at the Royal Marines School of Music. While in Ottawa, he was the principal trumpet with the CBC Orchestra and the CBC Brass Quintet as well as free-lancing as a studio musician. Jim was the founder of both the Ottawa Youth Band and Ottawa Youth Orchestra. He will be directing the Nova Scotia Youth Wind Ensemble in two concerts at the Rebecca Cohn Theatre at the opening concert, Wednesday evening.



KEVIN DEAN - Adjudicator/Clinician

Kevin Dean is presently serving as Professor of Jazz Studies at McGill University in Montreal. He has performed professionally with Ira Sullivan, Miroslav Vitous, Rob McConnell, Peter Leiteh and Dave Liebman. As well as performing, he teaches at the Jamie Aebersold Summer Jazz Workshops and is the President of the Association de Jazz de Montreal (J.A.M.). Professor Dean can be heard on his latest compact disc released last September entitled "Minor Indiscretions", performing his own original compositions and arrangements.



DINAH HELGESON — Evaluator/Clinician

Dinah Helgeson is presently serving as the Assistant Conductor/Accompanist of "The Imperials" in Kent, Washington. She has a private voice studio where she coaches thirty-two students. Dinah graduated from Pacific Lutheran University with a Bachelor of Arts in Music Education. She was soprano soloist with the "Choir of the West", under the direction of Maurice Skones. She pursued graduate studies at the University of Southern California in Choral Conducting and Vocal Performance. In addition, she taught secondary choral music for four years in Richmond and for five years in Kent.



DOUGLAS DUNSMORE - Evaluator/Clinician

Douglas Dunsmore is Associate Professor at Memorial University of Newfoundland School of Music and is presently completing work on his Doctorate in Music Education, Choral Conducting at the University of Wisconsin. Professor Dunsmore has appeared and performed with his choirs on both CBC Television and Radio, including a performance of Handel's Messiah. He has been guest conductor with the New England Chorus, Nova Scotia Youth Chorale and acted as Coordinator for the 1986 and 1988 National Youth Choir of Canada. As well, Professor Dunsmore serves as conductor of the Newfoundland Philharmonic Choir, and Choirmaster at Gower Street United Church in St. John's



SUSAN HOEPPNER - Clinician

Susan Hoeppner is a graduate of the Julliard School of Music in New York. She has soloed with major orchestras around the world including the Toronto Symphony, Calgary Philharmonic, Buenos Aires Symphony and Lisbon Radio Orchestra. In addition, she has performed in Japan, Hungary, Yugoslavia, France, Italy, Portugal, Great Britain, North and South America and with flute legends including Julius Baker, James Galway and Jean-Pierre Rampal. Ms. Hoeppner has won numerous awards and competitions including the Grand Prize in the Canadian Music Competition. Susan Hoeppner is sponsored by Yamaha Canada Music Ltd.



DR. RICHARD FISCHER - Adjudicator/Clinician

Dr. Richard Fischer joined the Faculty of Music of Concordia University in 1974 where he conducts the Chamber Winds, Wind Symphony and the Pit Orchestra. He also serves as Assistant Conductor of the Symphony of Oak Park and River Forest and the Music Director of the Elmwood Park Civic Ballet Company's production of the Nutcracker Ballet. He has performed with the Chicago Metropolitan Brass Quintet, Lansing Symphony Orchestra, and presently plays French Horn with the Concordia University Faculty Brass Quintet. Dr. Fischer is a member of the College Band Directors National Association, Music Educators National Conference, National Band Association, World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, the Conductors Guild and the International Horn Society.



ELDON A. JANZEN - Adjudicator/Clinician

Eldon Janzen is presently serving as Director of Bands and Coordinator of Music Education at the University of Arkansas where he teaches Graduate Conducting, Instrumental Teaching Methods and conducts both the Wind Ensemble and the Symphonic Band. He has previously served as Director of Bands at North Texas State University where he studied trombone. In addition, he has served as Division President of the College Band Directors National Association, is a member of the American Band Association, sponsor of the University Chapter of Kappa Kappa Psi and is currently International President of Phi Beta Mu Bandmasters Fraternity. His book "Band Director's Survival Guide" is used widely in college and university methods classes.



GORDON FOOTE - Adjudicator/Clinician

Professor Gordon Foote is currently serving as Chairman of Jazz Studies for the Bachelor of Music in Jazz Performance Degree at McGill University. This was the first degree of its kind in Canada. Gordon is the coordinator of Jazz Ensembles and directs McGill Jazz Ensembles 1. This gold award winning, internationally acclaimed ensemble has performed concerts with special guests and released a CD entitled "Day and Nite" in 1989, Gordon has taught at junior and senior high school levels while carrying out a busy performance career on woodwinds. Prior to accepting his post at McGill, Gordon was on the faculty of St. Francis Xavier University.



PAT LABARBARA — Adjudicator/Clinician

Pat Labarbara is a renowned musician whose quartet performs frequently in the Toronto area and has recorded two successful albums. 


BUCKLEY'S MUSIC CENTRE SPONSORS PARTICIPANTS' PARTY

The Stadacona Band was established at Halifax, Nova Scotia in January 1940 with a complement of sixty members. It is actually a number of bands within a single band including the Concert Band, the Parade Band, the Mess Bands, the large Dance Band, the small Dance Band, the Fanfare Trumpets and the Brass and Woodwind Ensembles.

They are required to perform at a variety of different kinds of functions annually and one or more of the combinations is appropriate for every engagement.

In 1978, Canada's Centennial Celebration, the Stadacona Band was featured from February to November in the Canadian Armed Forces Tattoo involving all service bands across the country. With the integration of the Canadian Armed Forces, September 1968 was the amalgamation of two other world touring forces bands, the Royal Canadian Artillery Band of Halifax and the HMCS Cornwallis Band, into the Stadacona Band. In 1986 the band was renamed the Stadacona Band of the Maritime Command.

The yearly schedule of the Stadacona Band includes television appearances and radio broadcasts, and concerts and parades throughout Canada. International travel is standard for all musicians and the band continues to perform in Europe, throughout the United States, South and Central America and the Caribbean. MusicFest is grateful for the assistance provided by Lieutenant-Colonel G.W. Klassen, Supervisor of Music for the Directorate of Ceremonial at National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa, for his endorsement.
