

CHAIRMAN, CANADIAN STAGE BAND FESTIVAL

Paul Read is Director of Jazz Studies at the University of Toronto and is coordinator of the National Music Camp Jazz Program. Mr. Read is an internationally renowned author, composer and arranger. He wrote two works for the Toronto Symphony Orchestra commissioned by the Canadian Native Arts Foundation and most recently was commissioned by the Manhattan Philharmonic Orchestra to arrange Oscar Peterson's "Hymn to Freedom" which he performed with the orchestra at Carnegie Hall. Paul was recently appointed as a jurist for the Juno Awards.

MUSICFEST CANADA 1993 CONCERT GOER'S GUIDE

In an effort to ensure that all participants in the 1993 Edmonton Festival enjoy and benefit from the experience, MusicFest Canada requests that all participating students and directors discuss the expectations pertaining to concert behavior as noted below. These expectations have been created to ensure that all audience members will be able to enjoy the performances in a quiet, concert hall atmosphere free from distractions of extraneous noise and movement. It is important that audience members show the same respect for performers on stage as they themselves would expect of an audience attending their performance.

HOW TO GET THE MOST OUT OF THE FESTIVAL PERFORMANCES AND EVENING CONCERTS!!

- 1. Try to sit together as a group with directors and chaperones in attendance.
- Do not talk during the performances. Even quiet conversation will distract those people seated around you and may also prevent the performers from giving you their best effort. Remember to show the same respect you would expect if you were on stage.
- 3. Try to stay seated for the entire concert. The Executive Committee for MusicFest Canada '93 has endeavored to keep concerts to a maximum of one hour and fifteen minutes so that you will be able to be seated for the entire performance. If you have to leave the concert hall for an emergency please try to do so between selections and definitely wait until an opportunity between selections to return to your seat. Reason ... any movement in and out of the concert hall will distract both your fellow audience members and the performers.
- 5. Remember to show appreciation in ways appropriate to the performance.

Let's make MusicFest '93 in Edmonton the most enjoyable and mutually supportive festival ever.

OUTSTANDING ADJUDICATORS/CLINICIANS



GREG BADOLATO - Clinician

Greg Badolato is currently serving as the Chairman of the Ear Training Department at the Berklee College of Music in Boston. He has performed with Chee Baker, Clark Terry, Kai Winding, Mick Goodnick, Gary Chaffee and Bill Frisell. As well he has performed and taught in Madrid, Perugia and Sante Fa with the Berklee on the Road education programs. Greg holds a degree in Music Education and studied at both Temple University and the Catholic University of America in Washington D.C. Greg Badolato is sponsored by the Berklee College of Music.



JEREMY S. BROWN — Adjudicator/Clinician

Jeremy Brown is presently serving as assistant professor in music education at the University of Calgary where he conducts the symphonic band, teaches saxophone, directs one of the two jazz ensembles and teaches music education courses. He recently was awarded a research fellowship from Ohio State University and was recognized as the "Outstanding Graduate Teaching Assistant" for his work with the wind ensemble and concert band. Mr. Brown has performed professionally with Paul Anka and Mel Torme, toured with "Annie" and "A Chorus Line", and recorded two albums with the Eastman School of Music and the Ohio State University Concert Bands.



ROBERT BAKER - Clinician

Robert Baker studied at the University of British Columbia where he obtained a B. Music. His studies continued at the University of Texas at Austin where he completed a Master of Music degree in Trombone Performance. Mr. Baker has performed with the Vancouver Symphony, CBC Vancouver Orchestra, Calgary Philharmonic, Calgary Jazz Orchestra and the "Phantom of the Opera" Touring Orchestra. In 1899 he was appointed as Assistant to the Director of the Summer Music Program at the Banff Centre and in 1990 was appointed as Trombone Instructor at Mount Royal College. Robert Baker is sponsored by Yamaha Canada Music Ltd.



DR. WARRICK CARTER - Adjudicator/Clinician

Dr. Warrick Carter is Dean of Faculty at the prestigious Berklee College of Music in Boston, Massachusetts. He has performed professionally at the Montreaux International Jazz Festival and appeared in Korea, Japan, Taiwan, Canada, Mexico and Brazil as a performer, lecturer, adjudicator and clinician. Dr. Carter is also the former chairman of the jazz panel and co-chair of the music policy panel of the National Endowment for the Arts. He is a respected author and a leading authority on jazz education in the college curriculum, indigenous American music, jazz pedagogy and black composers of the European tradition just to name a few. Dr. Carter is sponsored by the Berklee College of Music.



TOMMY BANKS - Adjudicator/Clinician

Tommy Banks is a composer, arranger, recording artist and professional performer. In 1992 he received the Gernini Award for best performance in a television variety program. He has been called upon by the Canadian government on numerous occasions as a musical director, and, recently, was appointed to the Canada Council and is an Officer of the Order of Canada. He conducted the first foreign jazz band to tour China in 1983, and has also toured Japan, Hong Kong and Malaysia. Tommy's distinguished career has included performances with Roberta Flack, Johnny Mathis, Mel Torme, Doc Severinsen, Dionne Warwick, Aretha Franklin, Cleo Laine, Henry Mancini and Dizzy Gillespie. In addition, he was the music director for the Pope's 1986 visit to Canada and for the 1988 Winter Olympic Games in Calgary.



DENNY CHRISTIANSON - Adjudicator/Clinician

Denny Christianson has made his mark as a performer, arranger, composer, studio musician, band leader and educator. He has toured extensively through Canada and Europe with his 18 man band and appeared on CBC, CTV and SRC television specials. His band has been featured at the Montreal International Jazz Festival and he has been honored with three nominations for Best Jazz Album of the Year. Denny has worked and recorded with Ray Charles, Stevie Wonder, Smokey Robinson, Jon Faddis, J.J. Johnson, Kai Winding, Bill Holman and Ed Shaughnessy. In addition, he is a faculty member of the National Music Camp and served as an awards juror for the Canada Council. Denny recently released his fifth album, this time with his new jazz fusion group, "Sortie", and most recently completed writing a full-length musical entitled "Nostradamus", based on the life of the famous French prophet.



DR. GEOFFREY BOERS - Evaluator/Clinician

Dr. Geoffrey Boers received his Doctorate in Choral Conducting with specialities in Renaissance Musicology and Choral Pedagogy. He has served as Music Director of the midwest's premier Baroque opera company, Ex Machina as well as Director of Music at Calvary Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. Dr. Boers is presently serving as Director of Choral Activities at Central Washington University where he teaches choral conducting, choral history, choral methods, voice and still finds time to sing professionally as a countertenor soloist with ensembles from throughout the United States.



DON CLARKE - Adjudicator/Clinician

Don Clarke has performed as a freelance musician on trumpet and flugelhorn with the CBC orchestra for 21 years and is a member of the West Coast Jazz Orchestra and Pacific Salt Jazz Sextet. His own band "New Orleans Connection" has toured in both Europe and Canada. Don has appeared on the CBC Jazz Workshop Series and frequently on Jazz Radio Canada. For the past nine years, Don has led the Don Clarke Band on Dr. Bundolo Radio and Television. He is well known for his commitment to music education and for his work with young musicians throughout Canada.



EVA BOSTRAND — Evaluator/Clinician

Eva Bostrand began her musical career in Stockholm, Sweden and specialized in pedagogical and operatic studies at the Royal Conservatory. She has toured and recorded extensively with the Swedish Radio Chamber Choir. Most recently she has performed with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra and is a founding member of Pro Coro Canada. Currently Ms. Bostrand teaches voice at the University of Alberta and Augustana University College. Ms. Bostrand has been honored with an Achievement Award for her outstanding contributions to the musical community in the province of Alberta.



KEVIN DEAN — Adjudicator/Clinician

Kevin Dean is presently serving as Professor of Jazz Studies at McGill University in Montreal. He has performed professionally with Ira Sullivan, Miroslav Vitous, Rob McConnell, Peter Leitch and Dave Liebman. As well as performing, he teaches at the Jamie Aebersold Summer Jazz Workshops and is the President of the Association de Jazz de Montreal (J.A.M.). Professor Dean can be heard on his latest compact disc released last year entitled "Minor Indiscretions", performing his own original compositions and arrangements.



THOMAS DVORAK - Adjudicator/Clinician

Professor Thomas Dvorak is Director of University Bands at the University of Wisconsin. He is the recipient of the "Outstanding Secondary Educator of America", "Citation of Excellence" from the National Band Association and has performed as a conductor in England, Belgium, France, Germany, Austria, Japan and throughout North America. Professor Dvorak has served for nine years as Chairman of the Band Composition Contest for the NBA, is a past Vice President of the organization and presently holds the post of President of the North Central Division of the College Band Directors Association. In addition, he is the principal author of a band/wind ensemble repertoire series for school bands entitled "Best Music for Young Band" and "Best Music for High School Band." He is founder and current Music Director of the Greater Milwaukee Youth Wind Ensemble Program.



ROBERT FOSTER — Adjudicator/Clinician

Robert Foster has held the post of Director of Bands at the Univers of Kansas for the past 20 years and is Chairman of the Graduate Progileading to a doctorate in band conducting. In 1989 he received "Sudler Trophy for Collegiate Marching Band". Professor Foster served as President of the Southwest Division of the College Bi Directors National Association, Chairman of the North American Bi Directors Coordinating Committee, is on the Selection Committee the ABA/Ostwald Composition Contest and is member of the Intentional Jury of the Sudler International Wind Band Composition Copetition. In addition, Robert is the President of the American Bandm ters Association, and President of the National Band Association, world's largest band organization.



MARVIN ECKROTH — Adjudicator/Clinician

Professor Marvin Eckroth has taught instrumental and choral music at Millikin University, University of Alberta and the University of Saskatchewan where he is currently Director of Bands. He is the leader of the Saskatoon Saxophone Quartet and has performed at the World Congresses in Germany and Washington. For the past ten years he has been a contributing editor to the "Canadian Band Journal" and his articles on wind instrument topics have been published in the "School Musician Magazine" and "The Saxophone Symposium". He has presented clinics and master classes at the Rotterdam Conservatory and University of Manitoba. In 1989 he conducted the University of Saskatchewan Wind Orchestra in the Netherlands and Jast March conducted the Honor Band at the Pacific Basin Festival in Honolulu.



SUSAN HOEPPNER — Clinician/Concert Artist

Susan Hoeppneris a graduate of the Julliard School of Music in New Yo She has soloed with major orchestras around the world including to Toronto Symphony, Calgary Philharmonic, Buenos Aires Symphony a Lisbon Radio Orchestra. In addition, she has performed in Japan, Ht gary, Yugoslavia, France, Italy, Portugal, Great Britain, North and Sot America and with flute legends including Julius Baker, James Galway a Jean-Pierre Rampal. Ms. Hoeppner has won numerous awards a competitions including the Grand Prize in the Canadian Music Competion. Most recently she released a CD which was produced in conjucti with Yamaha Executives Alan Ash and Stan Klebanoff. Susan Hoeppn is sponsored by Yamaha Canada Music Ltd.



JAMES FANKHAUSER — Evaluator/Clinician

James Fankhauser is Professor Music at the University of British Columbia where he conducts the University Singers. He also is director of the Vancouver Cantata Singers and has performed on CBC and appeared representing Canada in the BBC's International Choral Competition, where the Cantata Singers took first prize in 1981, followed by the Canada Council's Healey Willan Award. The University Singers won first prize three times in the Canadian National Choral Competition sponsored by the CBC. He has performed throughout Europe, the United States and Mexico. In addition, Professor Fankhauser serves as Assistant Director of the Aspen Choral Institute and has appeared as a soloist with the Vancouver, Toronto, Halifax, Baltimore and New York's American Symphony Orchestras. He is also a contributor to "The Choral Journal".



STEVE HOUGHTON — Clinician/Concert Artist

Steve Houghton is one of the most well rounded jazz drummers in the business and an acclaimed educator. He has performed with Be Florence, Bill Holman, Frank Mantooth, Toshiko Akiyoshi, Desverinsen, Dave Samuels, Gary Burton, Billy Childs, Jeff Berlin, Sce Henderson, Mark Johnson, Woody Herman and Freddy Hubbard just name a few. He is the National Percussion Chairman of the Internation Association of Jazz Educators, sits on the Board of Directors of the Percussion Arts Society and is a visiting faculty member at the Percusion Institute of Technology in Hollywood, California. Steve he authored four definitive tests for drummers: "A Guide for the Model Jazz Rhythm Section"; "Studio and Big Band Drumming"; "Essenti Styles for the Drummer and Bassist" and most recently "The Drummer's Performance Pak". Steve Houghton is sponsored by Yamab Canada Music Ltd.



DR. RICHARD FISCHER — Adjudicator/Clinician

Dr. Richard Fischer joined the Faculty of Music of Concordia University in 1974 where he conducts the Chamber Winds, Wind Symphony and the Pit Orchestra. He also serves as Assistant Conductor of the Symphony of Oak Park and River Forest and the Music Director of the Elmwood Park Civic Ballet Company's production of the Nutcracker Ballet. He has performed with the Chicago Metropolitan Brass Quintet, Lansing Symphony Orchestra and presently plays French Horn with the Concordia University Faculty Brass Quintet. Dr. Fischer is a member of the College Band Directors National Association, Music Educators National Conference, National Band Association, World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, the Conductors Guild and the International Horn Society.



DR. WAYNE JEFFREY — Adjudicator/Clinician

Dr. Wayne Jeffrey is Associate Professor at the University of Wester Ontario where he conducts the Wind Ensemble and Symphonic Bank He also teaches horn and chamber music in the Applied Departmen similar positions to which he held at the University of Toronto, University of Windsor and Queen's University. Dr. Jeffrey has appeared as guest conductor with the Eastman Wind Ensemble, the Hannafor Street Silver Band and the HMCS Stadacona Band. He is currently Music Director of the Pacific Symphonic Wind Ensemble. In addition he has appeared as a conductor and hornist on CBC, CJRT, CIQM, OR and BBC and has recorded with the Toronto chamber Winds on the Repetitive Libral.



GORDON FOOTE — Adjudicator/Clinician

Professor Gordon Foote is currently serving as Chairman of Jazz Studies for the Bachelor of Music in Jazz Performance Degree at McGill University where he is the coordinator of Jazz Ensembles and directs McGill Jazz Ensemble I. In 1992, Gordon accepted the position of Vice-Chairman of the Canadian Stage Band Festival Division of WusicFest Canada and a seat on the Executive Committee. Gordon has taught at junior and senior high school levels while carrying out a busy performance career on woodwinds. Prior to accepting his post at McGill, Gordon was on the faculty of St. Francis Xavier University. Recently, Professor Foote performed at the Guinness International Jazz Festival in Cork, Ireland and the McGill Jazz Ensemble I under his direction completed a European tour to be followed soon by their fourth compact disc release.



PAT LABARBARA — Adjudicator/Clinician

Pat Labarbara is a renowned musician whose quartet performs fre quently in the Toronto area and has recorded two successful albums. Pa has taught improvisation and woodwinds at Humber College for the pasteleven years. He is a member of the summer jazz faculty at the Banfl School of Fine Arts and the Jamey Aebersold summer jazz camp. For many years, Pat was the lead tenor with the Buddy Rich Band, participating in nine albums and appearing on numerous television shows including Ed Sullivan and Mike Douglas. In addition he has been featured on twenty-three albums and can be heard in two films and a variety of radio and television programs. Pat Labarbara is sponsored by Humber College.



ART LAPIERRE - Evaluator/Clinician

Art LaPierre is presently the Vocal Jazz Ensemble Director at the Berklee College of Music. Most recently he served as Assistant Director of Jazz Studies at the University of Northern Colorado. He has also directed vocal jazz ensembles at Polytechnic High School, California State University at both Long Beach and Los Angeles and Rancho Santiago Community College. His compact disk "Captured Alive" received the "Most Outstanding" award from Down Beat magazine. Mr. LaPierre serves as member of the American Choral Directors Association, California Music Educators Association, Music Educators National Conference and the Southern California Vocal Association. Art LaPierre is sponsored by the Berklee College of Music.



JOHN NUGENT - Clinician/Concert Artist

John Nugent is presently an Assistant Professor Music at McGill University where he performs regularly with his own quartet. He is one of Canada's premier young saxophonists. Following his graduation from St. Francis Xaviar and a stint at North Texas State with the One O'Clock Jazz Band, he went on to perform with Woody Herman, Ella Fitzgerald, Tony Bennet, Bob Hope, Mel Lewis and Clark Terry, just to name a few. In addition he has toured with The Temptations and Steve Ray Vaughn. John has two albums along with his jazz quartet, his album "Did I Tell You" has received international acclaim. John Nugent is sponsored by Yamaha Canada Music Ltd.



FRANK MANTOOTH - Clinician/Concert Artist

Frank Mantooth is a pianist, composer, arranger clinician and educator. His first Album for the Optimism label "Suite Tooth" received a four star review in the April 1990 Down Beat and Grammy nominations in three categories. His second album, "Persevere" featured Pete Christlieb and Clark Terry and was met with the same endorsement by the Jazz Times. Frank has published over 100 works for combo and jazs ensemble and just recently finished "Best Chord Changes for the World's Greatest Standards". He has written commissioned works for Texas Tech, Army Blues, Doc Severinsen, Bobby Shew, Ramsey Lewis, Airmen of Note and Louie Bellson. His most recent release on the Seabreeze label was "Dangerous Precedent" which features Ramsey Lewis and Clark Terry. Frank Mantooth is sponsored by Yamaha Canada Music Ltd.



TERRY O'MAHONEY - Adjudicator/Clinician

Terry O'Mahoney is presently serving as Assistant Professor at St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish, Nova Scotia where he teaches orchestral percussion, jazz drumming, jazz history, percussion ensembles, small and large ensembles and performs and records with the faculty jazz ensemble known as JazFX. He is president of the Nova Scotia chapter of the Percussive Arts Society. Terry has worked and performed with the Louisville Symphony Orchestra, Mose Allison, David Liebman, Oliver Jones, Ed Bickert and performed on numerous commercial recordings. He has studied with Jeff Hamilton, James Rago and Steve Rucker.



REJEAN MAROIS - Evaluator/Clinician

Rejean Marois teaches at Capilano College in the Jazz Studies Degree Program and directs their two vocal jazz ensembles, NiteCap and Capital Jazz along with one stage band. In addition, he is a staff member of the University of Northern Colorado Jazz Press. Until recently, Rejean lived in Quebec where he served eight years on the faculty at College Sainte-Foy. As a free-lance trombone player and vocalist, he toured and performed from 1977-1983 throughout the Middle-East, Germany, Holland and Canada. Rejean has written extensively for CBC television and was nominated for a Genie Award for his sound-track for the movie "Les Doux Ayeux".



MIKE PLUNKETT - Evaluator/Clinician

Mike Plunkett is currently the vocal music teacher at Carl Albert High School in Midwest City, Oklahoma where he teaches the concert choir, vocal jazz ensemble, show choir and jazz band. During the summer he instructs at a variety of music camps throughout the midwest including the International Music Camp in Bottineau, North Dakota and Inspiration Point Fine Arts Colony in Eureka Springs, Arkansas. In addition Mike is the Vocal Chairman of IAJE for the State of Oklahoma. His Master's Degree is in music education with an emphasis on jazz studies.



DARMON MEADER - Clinician/Concert Artist

Darmon August Meader is presently serving as the Musical Director of the New York Voices which he formed in 1987 with fellow classmates from Ithaca College. He has attended the University of Southern Maine and Ithaca College where he graduated. Darmon performs in New York as a freelance musician, where is acclaimed as among the premier "scat" singers and has toured throughout the world with the New York Voices. Most recently he returned from a tour of Japan. He can be heard performing on both GRP albums, "New York Voices" and "Hearts of Fire".



DR. GLENN PRICE — Adjudicator/Clinician

Dr. Glenn Price is Principal Conductor of Wind Ensembles at the University of Calgary where he also teaches conducting and percussion. In addition, he is the Artistic Director and Principal Conductor of the Calgary Wind Orchestra. He has performed with the Canadian Opera Company, Calgary Philharmonic, New Works Calgary, Alberta Ballet, Alberta Theatre Projects, National Ballet and the Eastman-Dryden Orchestra. Dr. Price has two recordings, one as the guest conductor of the Winnipeg Winds and the other with the University of Calgary Wind Ensemble. He completed post-doctoral studies in Saito conducting technique at the Toho Gakuen School of Music cand further studies at the Tanglewood Music Centre in Lenox. Mass.



RICHARD NACE - Evaluator/Clinician

Richard Nace presently teaches at the University of Puget Sound where he directs the University Chorale and Women's Chorus. Previously, he taught at Rogers High School, directed the USC University Chorus and for seven years taught at Pacific Lutheran University. His choirs have been featured guest artists at numerous ACDA and MENC convenions. Mr. Nace has worked extensively with Rodney Eichenberger, Maurice Skones, John Bloom, Robert Scandrett and Weston Noble. In addition, he has been the guest conductor of the Idaho All-State Choir, the ACDA Northwest Men's Honor Choir and is scheduled to be the guest conductor of the British Columbia Provincial Choir in 1994.



DOUG PULLEN - Clinician/Concert Artist

Doug Pullen is the former saxophonist with the Vancouver Symphony, Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony, Orchestra London and Stratford Festival. He has performed on CBC radio as a soloist with the CBC Chamber Orchestra and the Canadian Chamber Ensemble. Mr. Pullen previously held the position of saxophone instructor at the University of Victoria and is presently an instructor at the University of Western Ontario and Wilfred Laurier University.



PATRICIA ROOT - Adjudicator/Clinician

Patricia Root is currently serving in her fourth year as Assistant Director of Bands at the University of Tennessee. Previously she served as Assistant Director of Bands at Washington State University. Ms. Root began her band directing career in Michigan where she taught for ten years. In addition, she has served as a conductor of the United States Collegiate Wind Band on its summer European tour, as a member of the John Philip Sousa Foundation's Board of directors, Chair of the Suder Shield committee and Northwest President-elect of the Women Band Directors National Association, College Representative to the National Band Association and President-elect of the Tennessee Bandmasters Association.



BOBBY SHEW — Clinician/Concert Artist

Bobby Shew has performed throughout the world and as a Las Vegas sideman, has backed virtually everyone. He has performed with Art Pepper, Buddy Rich, Elvis Presley, Horace Silver, Louie Bellson, Toshiko Akiyoshi, Oliver Nelson, Benny Goodman, Maynard Ferguson, Neal Hefti, Don Menza and Bob Florence to name a few. 






STAGE LOCATIO




