Canada's Wonderland. Because of the overwhelming response, we will be again providing the cabaret venue for our participants. In addition, we stand committed to presenting worldclass performers who can carry the adjudication and clinic process to its ultimate realization: The concert stage.

sity that makes it practically impossible to present all facets in performance within the confines, each night, of a single headline performer. With all Festival Divisions working together to take advantage of the opportunities to provide the maximum exposure for the participants, we will be expanding the performances by 100% on the Friday and Saturday nights.

The headline performance for Thursday evening will be the renowned Air Command Band of the Canadian Armed Forces. On Friday, the stage will be shared by Canada's premier pianist Oliver Jones and his trio, with special guest trumpeter Al Vizutti, in addition to none other than the Winnipeg Singers. The Winnipeg Singers, under the direction of John Martens, has performed world-wide and received international acclaim. On Saturday evening Free Flight, riding high on their latest Funk/Fusion CD, will be performing and sharing the spotlight with Vancouver's vocal jazz ensemble, Nite Cap. And to complete the series, The McGill University Jazz Band will perform at the Closing Ceremonies. All of this is in addition to a complete slate of cabaret performances.

The line up of talent being offered to all MusicFest participants this year is the most outstanding in our history. More details concerning the concerts, adjudicators, clinicians, workshops and expanded scholarship opportunities are available on the following pages.

The City of Winnipeg and the Province of Manitoba are welcoming us with open arms on this our first return in over a decade. I hope to see you there!

MUSICFEST CANADA 1990 SCHOLARSHIP AUDITIONS

MusicFest Canada is pleased to announce that there will be \$31,000 in individual cash scholarships available at MusicFest '90 in Winnipeg.

The following scholarships are available:

Six General Motors of Canada Awards of Excellence - \$3,500 each Yamaha Distinguished Performer Award - \$3,500 Bell Canada Jazz Instrumentalist Award - \$2,000 Rico Golden Reed Award - Saxophone - \$1,500 Rico Golden Reed Award - Clarinet - \$1,500 MIAC Instrumentalist Award - \$1.500

All candidates must complete the attached application form, one for each Festival Division you are applying for (Stage Band, Concert Band or Choral) and send an audition tape by April 12, 1990. Candidates auditioning for the scholarships listed above may also be eligible for \$70,000 in scholarships being offered by post-secondary institutions. A. GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. The candidate must be in his/her final year of secondary school and be intending to pursue his/her studies with a professional musician/educator or at a suitable post-secondary institution.
- 2. The candidate must be a member of a performing ensemble participating in MusicFest Canada '90 in Winnipeg.
- The candidate must have his/her application form signed by his/her secondary school music educator and/or director of his/her performing ensemble.

- 4. The candidate must prepare two contrasting selections or one selection which includes two styles. The maximum duration of performance is 10 minutes. The candidate is encouraged to include at least one selection of Canadian origin.
- 5. Jazz candidates should improvise as part of their presentation.
- 6. Vocal candidates may prepare their selections in either or both traditional and jazz styles.
- 7. The candidate has the option of unaccompanied or accompanied auditions. Although it is strongly recommended that candidates use a single accompanying instrument (usually piano) MusicFest Canada recognizes that jazz candidates may wish to use a back up rhythm section and concert band percussionists may wish harmonic and melodic support. (MusicFest will accept a maximum of four accompanying persons.)
- 8. The candidate may apply in more than one area (eg. concert band and jazz, etc.): however, separate applications and tapes are required. No tapes will be returned. MusicFest recommends that a good quality audio tape be submitted.
- 9. The candidate will announce his/her name and selections at the beginning of the cassette tape. Print name and selections clearly on the tape label.
- 10. The candidate must be a Canadian citizen or a landed immigrant.

B. FINAL AUDITIONS

All applications and tapes will be screened by an adjudication panel. The panel will select the most outstanding candidates to perform in live auditions at the National Festival.

- 1. Finalists will be notified by May 1, 1990 of the date, time and location of their audition.
- 2. MusicFest will supply an acoustic piano, drum kit, bass amp, guitar amp, bass drum, 4 tympani (23", 26", 29", 32"), orchestra bells, xylophone and chimes for the candidates and/or accompanists (as specified on the application form).
- 3. The candidate will perform two contrasting selections or one selection which includes two styles. The maximum performance time is 10 minutes in front of an audience and a panel of adjudicators. The decision of the Festival will be final.
- 4. The candidate will supply his/her own own instrument except as noted in B 2.

C. ANNOUNCEMENT

The scholarship recipients will be announced at the Closing Ceremony.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

CANADIAN STAGE BAND FESTIVAL REPORT PETER STIGINGS, CHAIRMAN

Well — a new decade has arrived. The last decade of the twentieth century will present many challenges to the music education community in Canada. Many provincial and regional educational authorities are proposing sweeping changes in curriculum, funding, timetables and graduation requirements, to mention only a few of the issues we will be facing as we prepare for the 21st Century. Education is at a crossroads. We as music educators involved both in the classroom and with Festivals through our association with MusicFest Canada must be prepared to stand up for what we believe in.

Today's young people will face many social problems and complex issues in the next decade. What do we as music educators and Festival administrators have to offer the young people we come in contact with? Sure, we are still primarily interested in teaching music, but we also have a bigger responsibility to be concerned with the future that our young people will face. How can we help to prepare today's young people for the rest of this decade?

Recently, I have had the opportunity to review many worthwhile publications. Our assocaites in Alberta have produced a kit entitled "Music Matters" which includes what are in my opinion six of the best reasons for us to encourage students to Study Music:

- A good education helps convert "brains to minds", and the systematic study of music is a vital part of that process. It teaches mental discipline, creative problem-solving, attentiveness, reflection, and curiosity - qualities that animate us as individuals and that we look for in a cultivated mind.
- Music study provides unique opportunities for self-expression and creativity, thus encouraging a sense of grounding in an essential human experience. In a highly technological, materialistic society, we need the special pleasures that music can provide to help us establish the quality of our survival in a world preoccupied with quantity.
- 3. Music study is not just for the gifted or privileged. Its availability is a matter of individual intellectual freedom and development, both of which are essential to an active democracy and a vital musical culture. Music study enables us to make personal distinctions; to describe, interpret, and evaluate independently; and to make informed decisions about the music we like. This "independence of mind" is something we value as Canadians, cultivate in other fields, and should treasure in music study.
- Music study promotes cultural awareness, which is essential
 if individuals are to become strong contributors to their
 society. The greater our investment in young minds and the

more access we provide to our culture, the more likely that society will be repaid in the form of individual accomplishment.

- Music is a thing of profound beauty and the study of it is intrinsically worthwhile - a field with its own unique body of knowledge and skills. It is the mark of our civilization, and therefore to be cultivated.
- 6. Music provides an avenue for unparalleled social interaction and growth.

We at MusicFest are committed to the philosophical platform on which the above reasoning has been formulated and will endeavour to help create a national atomosphere in which the study of music will be encouraged and will flourish.

CANADIAN CONCERT BAND FESTIVAL REPORT JOHN WHITE, CHAIRMAN

It is hard to believe that in only slightly more than three months we will once again be meeting at MusicFest Canada to share ideas, inspiration and successes. MusicFest '90 in Winnipeg provides an excellent setting for the Canadian Concert Band Festival with all aspects of the Festival being held under one roof.

To facilitate the educational goal of the Festival, the Concert Band Committee has selected an exceptional panel of acclaimed adjudicators and clinicians. They include: Toshio Akiyama, Japan's "Mr. Band"; Dennis Prime, Director of the Edmonton Wind Sinfonia; David Becker, Director of Bands at Lewis and Clark College in Portland, Oregon; Gerald King, Director of the Wind Ensemble, University of Victoria; Dr. Ron Goddard, Professor and Director of Bands at Brandon University, Brandon, Manitoba; Dr. Wayne Gorder, Director of Bands at Kent State University, Ohio; Bram Smith, Director of the Wind Ensemble at the University of Toronto and former Director of the R.C.M.P. Band; and Marvin Eckroth, Director of Bands at the University of Saskatchewan, Saskatoon, In addition to providing excellent commentaries and clinics for the ensembles involved in the Festival, several of the adjudicators/clinicians will provide workshops during the Festival which are intended specifically for the directors of the groups.

As a further incentive to students at the Festival, additional funding has been gained to provide an even greater resource of cash and institutional scholarships at the 1990 Festival. Of particular interest to the Concert Band Festival is the addition of the Rico Golden Reed Award for the Most Outstanding Clarinentist. Please ensure that all interested students submit an application form and audition tape to the National Office by April 12,

1990. In total, over \$100,000 in scholarships and cash awards will be presented to deserving students at MusicFest.

Finally, may I take this opportunity to remind you that we are striving to ensure that the Chamber Ensemble category of the Concert Band Division is highly successful this year. In 1990, it is no longer necessary that Chamber Ensembles must be part of a larger participating group in the National Festival. Chamber Ensembles may independently gain access through the recommendation of Regional Coordinators or by submitting an audition tape to the National Office if there is not a Regional Festival in your area which includes the Chamber Ensemble category.

Best wishes for an exciting and successful period preceding MusicFest Canada. I look forward to seeing you in Winnipeg in May.

CANADIAN CHORAL FESTIVAL REPORT RUSS BAIRD, CHAIRMAN

"SERVE THE MUSIC". The first time I heard this phrase it passed through my mind that when one is "Serving the Music" one must be careful not to add too much ketchup. After much groaning I tried to understand why this phrase was such an important aspect of my evaluator's criticism.

Having done some composition and arranging, and listening to others perform my 'work', I realize that each director has his own interpretation. What, then, is my point? Simple! Serve the Music. Know that if we approach any piece with humility and sincerity and perform the work with as much musicianship as we can muster then we have done it right! If we fail to appreciate the meaning or do not work to the best of our ability then we are cheating ourselves and the person who wrote or arranged the piece. Hopefully we can help our students to realize some intrinsic truth in the value of our commitment and effort.

The Festival Evaluator in 1990 has a much more challenging job than the adjudicator of the past. The evaluator has a responsibility to help the ensemble to grow. To this end we have again assembled an exceptional panel of evaluators and clinicians for 1990 including Jerry Nowak, Rejean Marois, John Martens, Diana Spralding, April Arabian and Denise Narcisse-Mair. All are educators and philosophically 'in tune' with MusicFest.

The CCF is pleased to announce that the Ontario Vocal Festival is sponsoring a choral seminar for directors (May 18-20) running concurrently with the CCF. The seminar leader will be Canada's most distinguished secondary school choral educator and CCF Committee member John Trepp. For more information write to:
