





Ed Soph: The drum set is an improvisational instrument. That makes it exciting to teach because there are no rules. It's a chance to establish your own identity. Just imitating others defeats the whole purpose of the instrument. Hopefully, drum set teaching will never become codified. It's constantly evolving. The repertoire is the music and it's constantly changing. It's the newest teaching field.

Steve Houghton: A teacher should be in touch with what's happening. I have a view on studio work and going out on the road and I share that with my students. I have an educational background and was fortunate enough to have a good music ed program all throughout my schooling. When we did high school clinics with Woody Herman's band, I was young enough and my college experience was real fresh so I could communicate directly with the students. There was no gap. I'll never stop playing because it reinforces the teaching. Playing keeps me fresh.

*Ed Soph:* A lot of the ideas I get for my teaching come from my playing.

Horacee Arnold: Basically, I want my students to understand the possibilities of the drum set and mechanically be able to deal with it and explore. What I bring to a student is my twenty years of experience playing the instrument. Every musician, particularly every jazz musician, is a composer so I see things very compositionally. Music has to do with making complete "statements."

Ed Soph: A teacher's purpose is to get the students to think for themselves. A teacher cannot *teach* a student to be creative. You can only give them the tools.

Horacee Arnold: It's also important for a student to start out with good equipment because then they can realize their full potential on the instrument. Students hear the quality of a drummer's sound and they equate that with the quality of the instrument. There's a lot of quality control built into Yamaha drums. Yamaha is really a thinking company because they consider design aspects you might never have thought of.

Steve Houghton: Now there's a new trend with young drummers who want to be studio players. They used to want to get into big bands. Maybe Yamaha, with its new direction, can show the kids that if you want to be a studio drummer, it's very hard work. We're all working drummers, but we're also teachers and we're aware of the problems. Also, there are a lot more clinics nowadays, it's a real trend.

Ed Soph: The thing about clinics is that students are exposed to ideas they don't get anywhere else. I'm talking about a real clinic, not some guy getting up there and playing a solo at a million miles an hour, then saying, "any questions?" New tools like educational videos give students the chance to see a wide variety of drummers play, and they can learn from that.

Steve Houghton: Yeah, the better teachers are going to take videos and run with them. Yamaha is definitely striving to break new ground in this area.

## President's Report



John Nikel

The Canadian Stage Band Festival is a non-profit, educationally oriented, independent corporation operating on a year-round basis. The National Finals, held annually in May are the culmination of activities held throughout the country at schools, colleges, universities, concert halls and auditoriums. The Regional Co-ordinators donate generously of their time and expertise in organizing local clinics, workshops, concerts and festivals, both competitive and non competitive from September to April each year. It is through their efforts and insights that the Festival has been able to gradually expand its scope to include the area of music education and especially Jazz education. The National Co-ordinator's Committee, of which each Regional Co-ordinator is a voting member, is largely responsible for the direction and format at this year's 12th annual Finals in Toronto. My personal thanks goes to them and to the many regions they represent, for without them there would be no Canadian Stage Band Festival and Canada would be without a National Jazz forum.

The National Finals this year represent the high level of musical proficiency demonstrated by music educators and students throughout the 22 Regions. A staggering number of Jazz ensembles, well over 550, participated in regional Finals this year, with close to double that number involved in various other types of Festival sponsored activities. Actual competitors and participants are estimated to be over 25,000 including the addition of a new region, the North Saskatchewan Music Festival. The C.S.B. Festival is proud to be a part of many non-competitive festivals like Grande Prairie which began operations this year. As well, it is gratifying to see festivals with a strong educational base, doubling and tripling in participant numbers such as the Brandon Jazz Festival and the West Coast Jazz Festival. These should in no way overshadow the giant strides being made in Jazz education in the province of Quebec. This year we will be featuring Opus 17 from Montreal in our evening concert series as well as a large number of Quebec ensembles participating in the various competitive classes.


It is my firm belief that our new policy of education first and competition second is the prime reason for the large increase in participation at the National Finals this year. In keeping with the stated objectives in this area by the Regional Co-ordinators' Committee, the Clinic and Concert Committee of the Festival has organized an impressive 52 hours of clinics, workshops, seminars, open sectional rehearsals and band rehearsals featuring the best educators and performers in North America. The 14 adjudicators selected to evaluate the competing ensembles have come together to form a panel with unequalled expertise in the area of Jazz education and performance and their comments are quaranteed to aid in the improvement of every ensemble performing at this year's Festival. As one regional co-ordinator with a southern drawl said, "If you don't have a good time and learn a lot, it's because you don't want to."

A tradition with the Festival has been the annual television show. This extravaganza of young talent features the winning ensembles of the various classes and categories of competition as well as special guests. Television and radio broadcasters have thrown their full support behind the youth of the country through the Festival and continue to provide National exposure for the best young musicians Canada has to offer. Our gratitude goes out to CKY Television and Jim Purvis, the station manager, who independently have once again taken on the task of producing this annual show. As in the past, producer Rod Webb has assumed responsibility for what has become one of the highlights of the year's activities at the National level. Our thanks goes out on behalf of all the regions to the fabulous support and generous donations of air time which Moffat Broadcasting affiliates have made available to the local festivals. We also extend our thanks also to the CTV Television Network for creating time in their program schedule to allow every part of the country to see the youth of Canada perform.

The Canadian Stage Band Festival is a unique meeting ground for not only educators, but many other areas of the whole music field. Because of the necessary balance between music education, professional musicians, amateur musicians, media and the music industry, co-operation between the various groups is essential. Input from the growing number of participants, the production of the television and radio shows and the open nature of the activity have this year produced a warm atmosphere of communication and mutual understanding. We are indebted to Alan Wood, who represents all of Canada in the A.F. of M. and who has given his personal support and has cleared away any possible conflicts with the Musicians' Union. As well, Alan Ward has accepted the Chairmanship of the Canadian Music Publishers' Advisory Committee and is acting as a consultant and negotiator in the rather complicated areas of Copyright. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Robert R. Richmond, the retiring founding president of the Canadian Stage Band Festival. Robert built the Festival over the past 12 years to a position of great respect among Jazz educators across Canada. We wish Bob the best of luck as he embarks on a new professional career.

I cannot say that the Festival itself is financially solvent quite yet. As with many Arts oriented organizations, we were adversely affected by the recent recession. Through extremely prudent financial management and a number of cost cutting measures, we have developed a new, strong fiscal policy that will see the Festival on a much stronger foundation this year. Art Divers, the financial wizard of Yamaha Canada Ltd., has managed as Treasurer to re-establish our priorities and has reorganized the accounts and budgets in light of the new financial directions being taken by the government and private sectors based on our post recession economic atmosphere. As a non-profit organization, our financial stability is dependent on business expertise in order to secure corporate, government and private funding through sponsorship. Our two major corporate sponsors deserve the utmost gratitude from everyone involved with the festival. During the height of the recession when virtually every government, private and corporate funding organization began withdrawing support for the arts in part or total, our two corporate sponsors maintained their generous level of funding. Yamaha Canada Music Ltd., donated office space, telephone, equipment, clinicians, technical staff and a substantial cash donation to keep the Festival operating and has reaffirmed their commitment for continued support at the Regionals as well as the nationals. We are grateful to Tim Craig, Brian Diesterheft and above all to Mr. Naomasa Mitani, the Canadian President. Moffat Communications Ltd. continued with vast amounts of air time and cash donations that have kept the Festival operating both Regionally and Nationally now for so many years. We thank Mr. Jim McLaughlin, Vice President and General Manager and of course Mr. Randy Moffat, President of Moffat Broadcasting for their commitment and continued support of the Festival. It is partially through their sponsorship that we will be able to negotiate and secure other corporate sponsors on behalf of the Fe

If you are reading this program, you have joined us for this great 12th annual National Festival. I personally welcome you, and know that you will enjoy the National Finals here in Toronto. In order to make our activities as accessible as possible, we will not be charging admission for any competitions or evening concerts. Please celebrate with us, because the Festival is for you. Your involvement, in any manner, is a contribution to the development of young Canadian music talent and an investment in the future of the youth of our country.

## National Co-ordinators' Message

I would like to personally thank all those who have worked so hard this year at both the Regional and National levels. I was very fortunate and honoured to be asked to assume the rather expanded position of National Co-ordinator. My duties included a priceless oportunity to travel to regions from Victoria to St. John and see first hand the strong and energetic the development of jazz is, educationally and from a performance standpoint. The Regional Co-ordinators and their respective Committees demonstrated a deep, sincere concern for the young musicians who participated in their festivals. This was evident through their choice of adjudicators, educational supplements such as clinics, lectures and workshops, first class treatment of all the participants and the efficiency with which the actual technical operation was carried out. Each region seemed to excel in a different area and I was continually astonished and amazed at the myriad of subtle differences in each festival's unique operation. I must say that the consistent element amongst all the regions was that there was an atmosphere generated by the Co-ordinator and the adjudication panel that pervaded each Festival and gave it an individual stamp. Many of the new ideas being implemented at this year's Nationals are a direct result of either ideas I have unashamedly stolen from various regions (for which they will of course get no credit) or little twists to basic concepts that I have been able to refashion and utilize on a larger scale.

If the success of the National Finals is to be measured relative to the success of the Regionals, and of course this is the only logical criteria of prediction, the Nationals will be the best ever. Orchestrating the National Finals is a very large part of my overall function with the Festival. With the virtually unlimited resources available in the regions, I have been able to organize a number of committees. These committees have produced results that have far exceeded my expectations upon inception and they have in fact turned the normal logistical nightmare of an operation this size into an efficient, warm and educationally viable event. I only have one regret and that is that at the time of printing, I did not have all the support staff quite confirmed. They will receive my gratitude in the June Newsletter wrapping up the Festival for the Summer. However, I am delighted to be able to publicly announce the various Committees who have made my job so easy over the past year and who are determined that the 12th annual Finals be the most productive festival in our history.

## Clinics Workshops Seminars

#### Drum Set Clinics STEVE HOUGHTON

These clinics are geared to those wishing to know the technical details surrounding the drum set and include the function of the drums in jazz, rock, big band and small ensembles. Topics will include tuning, choice of accessories, individual functions of the various elements of the drum set, technical skills and how to develop them, soloing and listening skills. #### Directors' Improvisation And Materials Seminars PAT LABARBERA. BUDDY BAKER


